Professional Awards

NEW THIS YEAR

Champions for Change Award:

This NEW award is intended to honor agencies with unique, innovative and exemplary practices that remove barriers, result in positive social change and inspire others to follow in their path. It improves the working experience and engagement levels of employees from underrepresented communities, and/or the lives of all people through delivery of excellent services and programs

Some practices include:

- Increase access
- Foster diversity and inclusion
- Addresses environmental impacts
- Overall enhancement of social equity within their community or organization

Professional Awards - Lasting Legacy Award

(formerly known as Distinguished Service)

This award honors ALL Parks and Recreation professionals that have retired within the past 2 years – with a minimum of 10 years of service in the field - and a minimum of 5 years as a WRPA Member or Agency Member

Professional Awards - Impact and Influence Award

(formerly known as Honor Fellow)

This is the highest recognition bestowed by WRPA to an individual, recognizing their dedication and achievement in the field of parks and recreation. Nominees must have a minimum of 10 years of service in the field and have been a member of WRPA for at least 10 years.

Nominees should be professionals that demonstrate consistent commitment to the field of parks and recreation, service to their community and furthering the goals of WRPA.

Some attributes of nominees:

- Significantly contributed to WRPA in ways that have affected the philosophy and practices of the organization
- Initiated or implemented recommendations that promotes and advances the value of parks and recreation
- Repeatedly accepted and eagerly welcomed leadership opportunities within WRPA

Professional Awards - Emerging Professional

(formerly known as Young Professional Award)

This category recognizes up and coming future leaders in the field of parks and recreation.

Nominees should possess the qualities and talents that will result in their assuming influential roles within their agency and/or WRPA in the future. Nominees need to have at least 3 years of service as a parks and recreation professional and as a WRPA member.

- Served as a speaker at conferences, webinars, network meetings or other such gatherings to promote parks and recreation
- Served in influential positions in their community and/or with WRPA

- Minimum of 5 years of service & WRPA membership (individual or agency)
- Nominees should demonstrate consistent commitment to the field of parks and recreation, service to their community and assist in furthering the goals of WRPA. Some ways nominees could have made qualifying contributions:
 - Served in influential positions in their community or within WRPA
 - Significantly impacted the advancement of parks and recreation within their community or within WRPA
 - Held a network, committee or board position within WRPA
 - Served as a conference, webinar or other training presenter.

FACILITIES, PARKS & TRAILS ~ Recognizes the highest standards in design, development and renovation of parks and recreation areas.

- Projects must be completed (fully constructed) during the past 2 years. Agency or nominating party must be a WRPA member.
- Projects have successfully addressed a community or regional need and have demonstrated a creative use of resources, materials or partnerships.
- INDOOR SPACE ~ Facilities that have rood and walls and that are utilized for recreation.
