Washington Recreation & Park Association End of Week 1 Report - Sunday January 19th, 2025

The Washington State Legislature convened for the 105-day regular legislative session on Monday, January 13. This is the start of a new biennium, where the legislature is tasked with passing a balanced budget, and will also debate policies on important topics like housing and homelessness, education, human services, behavioral health, the environment, and public safety. The 2025 legislative session will be particularly challenging, as the state is facing a projected shortfall of \$12 – 16 billion dollars over the four-year outlook.

The week started with opening ceremonies on Monday, as dozens of new legislators were sworn in and welcomed to Olympia, and legislators officially elected leadership positions and approved chamber rules. On Tuesday, Governor Inslee gave his outgoing State of the State address, speaking to achievements made over the last 12 years and encouraging legislators to continue progress on important issues ahead. On Wednesday, all nine statewide officials were sworn into office, including Governor Ferguson, who gave his inaugural address to a joint session of the legislature. Governor Ferguson laid out many of his priorities including public safety, housing affordability, and free lunches for all students. Governor Ferguson even called out specific pieces of legislation on these topics and others – that are prime sponsored by both democrats and republican legislators alike – that he hopes to sign into law later this session, indicating his willingness to work in a bipartisan fashion.

As he laid out his priorities, it was apparent that the new Governor will be taking a different approach than his predecessor. In his inaugural speech, Governor Ferguson said "I'm not here to defend government. I'm here to reform it" – a line that gained applause from republicans. Governor Ferguson has also been clear that he favors agency efficiencies and even budget cuts before exploring new taxes, and has said publicly that new taxes should be a last resort (this Seattle Times article also covers some of these highlights). Many expect that Governor Ferguson will be very active and engaged in the legislative process throughout the session and beyond.

In addition to these opening ceremonies, legislators got right down to business in week 1, introducing hundreds of bills, scheduling work sessions in committee, and holding public hearings on legislation. As the session progresses, there are key cutoffs that bills need to meet to remain under consideration by the legislature (special exceptions apply). The first legislative deadline is February 21st, when bills must pass out of their respective policy committees to remain alive. See below for important cutoff dates for the 2025 session.

Feb. 21 – Day <i>40</i>	Policy cutoff in house of origin - last day to pass bills out of the policy committees in the chamber they were introduced
Feb. 28 - <i>Day 47</i>	Fiscal cutoff in house of origin - last day to pass bills out of fiscal committees in the chamber they were introduced
Mar. 12 - <i>Day 59</i>	House of origin cutoff - last day to pass bills out of the chamber they were introduced (House bills out of House, Senate bills out of Senate). 5pm deadline
Apr. 2 - <i>Day 80</i>	Opposite house policy cutoff – all bills from the other chamber must pass out of the policy committees

Apr. 8 - <i>Day 86</i>	Opposite house fiscal cutoff – all bills from other chamber must pass out of the fiscal
