Bill Status & Upcoming Events Report End of Week 3 Report - January 27th, 2024

Saturday, January 27 marks day 20 of the legislative session, and with that we're already one third of the way through the 2024 session. Committees are still holding hearings on bills as well as scheduling bills for executive action, which is the action of voting bills out of committees. Bills are continuously being amended and revised as they move through the legislative process which requires ongoing monitoring and review. On Wednesday January 31, we will hit our first official legislative deadline where all policy bills must be voted out of their policy committee to remain *alive* this session. Bills in fiscal committees face a similar deadline just five days later, on February 5.

Initiatives to the Legislature

The six initiatives organized by conservative interest group, Let's Go Washington, and filed by State Republican Party Chair and Representative Jim Walsh (R – Aberdeen), have been undergoing the signature review process by the Secretary of State. Earlier this week, the last of the six initiatives were officially certified as they all received enough valid signatures. This is important, as a couple of the initiatives could impact state revenues in a significant way. As a reminder, the six initiatives are:

- I-2113: Reasonable Police Pursuit
 - o Ballot Measure Summary: This measure would remove certain restrictions on when peace officers may engage in vehicular pursuits. Such pursuits would be allowed when the officer has a reasonable suspicion a person has violated the law, pursuit is necessary to identify or apprehend the person, the person poses a threat to the safety of others, those safety risks are greater than those of the pursuit, and a supervisor authorizes the pursuit.
- <u>I-2117: Stop the Hidden Gas Tax</u>
 - Ballot Measure Summary: This measure would prohibit state agencies from imposing any type
 of carbon tax credit trading, including "cap and trade" or "cap and tax" programs, regardless of
 whether the resulting increased costs are imposed on fuel recipients or fuel suppliers. It would
 repeal sections of the 2021 Washington Climate Commitment Act as amended, including

repealing the creation and modification of a "cap and invest" program to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by specific entities.

- I-2124: Opt. Out of State-run Long Term Care Coverage Act
 - o Ballot Measure Summary: This measure would amend state law establishing a state long term care insurance program to provide that employees and self-employed people must elect to keep coverage under RCW 50B.04, allow employees to opt-out of coverage under RCW 50B.04 at any time, and repeal a current law governing exemptions for employees who had purchased long term care insurance before November 1, 2021.
- I-2109: Repeal the Capital Gains Tax
 - Ballot Measure Summary: This measure would repeal an excise tax imposed on the sale or exchange of certain long-term capital assets by individuals who have annual capital gains of over \$250,000.
- I-2111: No State Income Tax
 - Ballot Measure Summary: This measure would prohibit the state, counties, cities, and other local jurisdictions from imposing or collecting income taxes, defined as having the same meaning as "gross income" in the Internal Revenue Code.
- I-2081: Parental Notification
 - O Ballot Measure Summary: This measure would allow parents and guardians of public-school children to review instructional materials and inspect student records, including health and disciplinary records, upon request. It would require public schools to provide parents and guardians with certain notifications, including about medical services given and when students are taken off campus; access to calendars and certain policies; and written notice and opportunities to opt students out of comprehensive sexual-health education and answering certain surveys or assignments.

The Legislature now has three options in dealing with all six initiatives individually:

- 1. They can ignore them, resulting in the initiatives going on the November 2024 ballot for voters to consider.
- 2. They can propose an alternative. If this happens, the original qualified initiative and an alternative created by the Legislature are both placed before voters on the ballot.
- 3. They can approve the initiative and the initiative becomes law.

At this point in time, the majority party has not indicated if they will consider any of the initiatives as filed.
