Washington Recreation & Park Association End of Week 8 Report – March 2, 2024

Friday, March 1st marked the last deadline before the end of the 2024 Legislative Session – bills needed to have passed both the House and Senate chambers to remain alive and under consideration this year. After a bill passes both chambers, the bill either proceeds to the Governor to be signed into law (or vetoed) or returns to the original chamber on the Concurrence Calendar, which means the bill was amended by the second chamber and must be reapproved in its new amended form by the original chamber.

Concurrence Calendar Process: To pass the Legislature, bills on the Concurrence Calendar require reconciling the differences between the two versions passed by each chamber. The chamber of origin can either concur with the opposing chamber's amendments, ask them to recede from their amendments, or request a conference committee with a limited group of legislators to craft a compromise version of the bill. The House and Senate must reach an agreement on the final version of the bill prior to end of session, or the bill dies.

Governor Signing Process: Once a bill is passed by the Legislature and delivered to the Governor, he has 5 days (excluding Sundays) to act on the bill, or 20 days to act if the bill is delivered to him within 5 days of the end of session. The clock starts once a bill is delivered which could be within days of passage, or the House and Senate may strategically delay delivering the bill to the Governor, so he has more time to act on the bill. In Washington, the Governor has three options on bills that reach his desk: 1) Sign the bill into law 2) Veto the entire bill 3) Partially Veto the bill by removing entire sections. The Governor does not have line-item veto authority which means removing sentences or words within a section of the bill.

Over the next 5 days, the legislature will focus on budget negotiations, bills on the *Concurrence Calendar* and bills that are *Necessary to Implement the Budget*. The legislature may also consider the three initiatives that had public hearings earlier this week. The final day of the 2024 Legislative Session is Thursday, March 7.

Budget Development

Lawmakers are currently meeting behind the scenes to negotiate differences between the House and Senate versions of the three supplemental biennial budgets – the Operating, Capital, and Transportation budgets. Once negotiations are complete, the final budgets will be released to the public – usually with only a couple days left in session.

Initiative Update

This past week, the legislature held public hearings on three initiatives: <u>I-2113</u> (concerning police pursuits), <u>I-2111</u> (prohibiting state income tax) and <u>I-2081</u> (parental notification) and then proceeded to pass these initiatives out of committee. The next significant step for these initiatives would be a vote on the House and Senate floors. Recent news coverage can be found here:

House and Senate Democrat leaders <u>announced</u> that public hearings would not be held on <u>I-2117</u> (repeal of the Climate Commitment Act), <u>I-2109</u> (repeal of the capital gains tax) and <u>I-2124</u> (opt-out of Washington's long-term care program). Those proposals will go directly to the November ballot.
